

It has also been lovely to welcome our parents back into the classroom this term. We have held some 'come and read' sessions for our parents and children to share together.






The children returned in January well rested and ready to learn and have worked extremely hard this term. In English we began with fairy tales and the children had fun acting out the story of the three little pigs.

During this term we have also looked at pattern in our Art lessons and have learnt how to use the technique of 'rubbings' to trace patterns from the natural world.



During our Geography lessons in the first half of the spring term, we began by learning about the local environment and went on a walk of the local area to find human and physical features. The children then learnt the names of the countries in the UK and found out their capital cities.

In our Science lessons during the second half of the spring term we have been learning about growing plants. We have planted bean seeds and are looking forward to seeing how big they will grow – maybe we will have our own beanstalks soon!





We also took part in a whole school science week where we found out about different life cycles, with a focus on the life cycle of a butterfly. The children made some amazing mobiles to show the different stages of the butterfly life cycle.

The spring term has flown by, with plenty of fun alongside an incredible amount of learning! We








We loved seeing the children dress up in Harry Potter costumes or nightwear for World Book Day!

During History, the children have been learning all about Kidderminster and produced a tourist information leaflet about our town.





Our Geography topic has been all about Coasts. You have used words to describe different coasts such as human and physical landmarks. We all wish you a relaxing break and look forward to seeing you back in school for the Summer Term.














We began the term by looking at the second book in a trilogy by Aaron



The children used their imaginations and creative writing skills to produce their own narrative for the picture book based on the adventures of Rosie and Tom. We then moved onto the book 'The Iron Man'.



On our first day we looked at the first page description of the Iron Man and created some art work to show what we thought he looked like. We then created our own Iron Man out of cardboard boxes and recycling materials. In the book, it talks about the Iron Man falling off a cliff. We recreated this outside and took pictures. We used these pictures to write our own descriptions. We have also written letters, stories and a newspaper report about the Iron Man.

In Maths, we completed our work on fractions before moving on to decimals, area, perimeter and finishing with statistics. What a busy time you had with Maths!

Our History topic was looking at a local wartime hero John Francis Young.
We researched about his life and his bravery which led him to be awarded the Victoria Cross.



In D&T, we used our sewing skills to make a felt pizza.



In RE, we continued our learning about the life of Hindus in Britain, studying their lives as well as communal and private worship. After the half term, we moved onto looking at the Easter story. This topic has seen us revisit the Eater Story where we have empathised with Mary's character and created posters celebrating the importance of the special days during the Easter Season.

Our Science topic enabled the children to use their investigative skills while exploring ways of altering sound vibrations. It was lovely to see the work produced and some of the ways that the children extended their learning by developing their own investigations.

We then moved onto States of Matter and how materials can be changed by heating and cooling.



Finally, in Art, we have been looking at manmade and natural patterns and using the work of Owen Mortensen as inspiration to create our own picture using printing.










In English, the children looked at

They analysed several of the poems and then wrote their own, producing some outstanding pieces of work. We finished off the unit of work by going to Forest School where the children had to find their own 'lost words'. During the second half of the term, we have been reading a book called 'Wolf



by Michelle Paver which is set in 600 B.C. and full of descriptive vocabulary. As part of this unit of work, we visited Forest School where the children learnt how to build shelters and create a fire. So far, they have written their own survival guide, diary entry and descriptions of a character and setting.





In Maths, at the beginning of the term, the children explored shapes and angles and this half term we have focused on fractions. They now know all about equivalent fractions and how

to add and subtract proper fractions and mixed numbers.


The children have also been working scientifically during our science lessons and investigating properties and changes to materials. Amongst other things, they examined changes to materials due to heating and cooling and looked at reversible and irreversible changes.

This half term they have been looking at life cycles and were very excited to observe how our very own monarch butterflies developed.



In DT, the children designed and created their own moving toys and in art they have been studying Piet Mondrian and creating their own version of his art.

As you can see, it has been a very busy term and the children deserve a well earned break. The Year 5 team hope you all have a lovely Easter and we look forward to seeing the children again next term.






Year 6 have worked incredibly hard throughout the Spring term.

Spring is always a great time to celebrate creativity and appreciate the wonders of nature that are all around us.

In Reception and year 1, we've been enjoying the amazing growth at the Forest School site: plenty of leaves on the trees to camouflage us in hide and seek, beautiful flowers to spot and identify, mini-beasts to find and butterflies to admire.

The bees have been busy pollinating the flowers and we've seen lots of ladybird larvae and pupae. A little bit of tree climbing and the rope bridge



and swing are always popular too! Year 2 have also enjoyed observing the incredible changes as we've moved from spring to summer. We celebrated spring by making some clay 'Green man' images and the children have learnt to identify common trees by their leaves, creating some beautiful leaf rubbings in the process. We love watching the ladybird's life cycle as the larvae become pupae and then hatch into adult ladybirds – we have lots of ladybirds at Forest School and the children have practised using a tally chart to record how many they find.

As well as playing many team games and independent activities, both classes have had the opportunity to enjoy toasting marshmallows – a firm favourite at St John's!

We've loved seeing Key Stage 2 classes on Wednesdays for a well-being outdoor afternoon. As well as having a go at bug hunting, ladybird spotting and a few crafts, some groups have also been able to toast marshmallows over the fire and enjoy a few smores.
